The importance of social interaction by Ms Indira

One of the key developments in early childhood is social and emotional. It may not seem as important as cognitive, but it is a crucial factor that shapes a child. From the moment babies are born, parents and caregivers start to interact with them, which is the beginning of social development for newborns.

Social, alongside emotional and cognitive development, is imperative in early childhood education. Happy children generally learn and understand concepts faster, as their physiological and psychological needs, including love, acceptance and belonging, are met. One of the main reasons we send our children to preschool is to enhance their social skills, to get along with others, and to develop their communication skills.

As parents and teachers, we want our children to function in society and be successful in whatever they choose to do or be. Throughout their lives, they will have to interact with different people and situations. We want our children to be open-minded communicators and thinkers who can effectively communicate and problem solve independently.

At PIPS, we understand the importance of positive social interactions. Throughout their years at PIPS, we plan and provide authentic opportunities for children to interact with peers and adults around the school to develop their social skills.

How can parents support social interactions outside school?

- Demonstrate and show affection and acceptance for your child / children every day. Let them know that their family still loves them for who they are, even if they have made some bad decisions.
- Modelling - we want to act as we want our children to behave.
- Provide your child with opportunities to interact with children outside school, such as play dates, joining various clubs or simply going to the playground
- Have conversations with your child, and ensure their voices are heard. Encourage your child to reflect and talk about exciting interactions they had in school. Opening questions can include;

'Who did you talk to today? What did you talk about? Was there anything interesting that happened during school?'

- Talk to your child about your own day, encourage them to ask you questions.
- Plan interactive hands-on experiences that have the opportunity to interact with different people in different situations, such as travelling to new places.
- Provide choices for your child whenever feasible, discuss the options with your child, weigh in the pros and cons of the various choices they have.
